<u>I have strong experience researching and developing policy based on numerous professional experiences</u>. For example, as an intern at the Knight Foundation, I was responsible for conducting research on Downtown St. Paul's "creative economy." On the quantitative front, my undergraduate major, quantitative sciences, is a unique course of study that makes me uniquely suited to the work of MDRC. Half of my courses deal with math, statistics, and coding methods, while the other half is comprised of policy, economics, and sociology classes. I hope to bring this combination of quantitative and qualitative skills to work at MDRC.
